### HERITAGE TELANGANA

Where do our Heritage Rocks stand?

In December 2015, the Government of Telangana deleted the Heritage Conservation Regulation which had been created under the Hyderabad Urban Development Authority (now HMDA) in 1997. This Regulation had notified, apart from a long list of Heritage Buildings, 25 Rock Formations and Rock Areas as Heritage Precincts in the HMDA area.

In March 2017, the Telangana Assembly passed the **“Telangana Heritage (Protection, Preservation, Conservation and Maintenance) Act, 2017”**, now covering the whole of Telangana State. It lists 334 buildings – Pre- and Protohistoric Sites, Forts, Temples, Mosques, Tombs, Buddhist Monuments, Inscriptions, a few Colonial Monuments - just over 30 of them in Hyderabad.

And no Rock Formations. Does this mean that the rocks which were on the Heritage List till December 2015, are no longer of any interest to our government? That the geological heritage of the city and, by implication, of Telangana need not be preserved? That builders and town planners can do away with any of the hitherto protected rocks? That deliberate permission is given to destroy our city's landscape heritage? And this concerns not only Rock Formations: most of the erstwhile Heritage Buildings would be free for destruction.

It could surely have been possible to incorporate the HMDA Heritage Conservation Regulations' list into the new law. One could then have discussed which rocks and buildings might have to be deleted, if necessary. **This Act is vastly demoralising for all NGOs as well as numerous government officials who have been working on preserving the historical and geological ambiance of Hyderabad, for the last 20 – 30 years.**


## THE FATE OF OUR FAMILIAR URBAN ROCKS

Recently two small but noticeable rocks are yet again bearing the brunt of change – changing governance and changing mindsets – resulting in changing environment. The two rocks stand on either side of Begumpet Road just before the Greenlands signal (coming from Punjagutta).

It's hard to miss the big fat rock that sits stubbornly at the edge of the new Telangana State IAS Officers' Institute (TSIASOI) inside the Manjeera Guest House. Fortunately, this one has held its ground and inspired the architect to use it as a natural screen beside the recently inaugurated swimming pool shielding it from the busy main road. No way is this gigantic specimen allowing any curious onlooker a peek into the pool! Few other small rocks have been kept for the ambience and some unlucky ones have been chopped in half giving room for a road.

Just across the road, in the premises of the Greenlands Guest House, stands a small clump of rocks seemingly scared that their days are numbered. Among these is one specially note-worthy rock that stands apart for its very fine balancing act. If you are caught in a traffic jam on top of the Greenlands flyover, this is your chance to glance to the right and get an aerial view of the rocks (between the guest house and the SBI Training Centre).

Perhaps, they stood tall in the days of the Nizam when this pretty building came up in 1927. Until 1982 this was used as the Chief Ministers official residence before being declared a Heritage Structure in 1988. Currently, it is the office of the Department of Protocol which looks rather bare with the old furniture dumped outside close to the rocks. There has been talk and newspaper reports that this heritage building is being pulled down to give way to something bigger, probably less elegant and more lucrative.



## **ORVAKAL ROCK GARDEN SHOOTS INTO PROMINENCE**


The full-moon weekend of June 9./10./11. 2017 saw much festive activity at the Rock Garden in Orvakal, 25 km east of Kurnool/Andhra Pradesh. GRB Pradeep, our Joint Secretary, and Amardeep Singh, Life Member of the Society, took a short trip to Orvakal to get a feel of how the only Rock Garden in the Telugu states has been presented and highlighted. And they say it was amazing: Thanks to the Government of Andhra Pradesh and its very active Tourism Corporation, the

usually quiet rocky retreat was transformed into an arena of adventure sports, entertainment and generous hospitality – with the full moon occasionally peeping through the monsoon clouds at night. From sporty events (ziplining, rappelling, river crossing, rock climbing etc.) to all kinds of indoor entertainment, there was no dearth of activities to choose from. It was quite rightly called “Orvakal Rock Festival”

What might have been missing is Rock Walks to give the opportunity to explore more of the rocky landscape of the interior, and the Society will be happy to provide guides at future events.

Arrangements were made for overnight stay of guests from as far away as Bangalore and Hyderabad, whereas many local visitors dropped by for the day to enjoy the offer of a good and entertaining outing in the amazing rocks. Ministers and officials from the cities and Kurnool lent the event the emphasis on development of the whole of the Kurnool area and surroundings.

The 1000 acre Orvakal Rock Garden is the first official Rock Park set up by the Government of AP a few years back. The layered sedimentary rock formations – so different from the solid rounded balancing granites of Hyderabad and surroundings – offer spectacular views and landscapes.
